




Boulder Parade of Lights, by Catherine Weldon

Making Computer Games—Introducing Children to **Computer Programming**

Boulder county is filled with families connected to the computer industry. A recent study ranks the area tops in per capita numbers employed in technology fields. This creates an environment where children are raised in families familiar with computers. I'm sure I share many parents concerns with just how the computer is being used by my child.

Game playing seems to be the area of computers that most fascinates my son. Most of these games seem to have little redeeming value unless his future career choice is a fighter pilot. But there is a way we can turn our kids' interest in playing games into an educational activity that will help them attain computer literacy and important critical thinking skills they can use in any area they study.

I've found that teaching game creation as a doorway into programming is a natural fit. The kids come to class enthusiastic, don't want to take breaks and don't want to leave after 4 hours of learning and creating. Of course, what they are doing is programming software, an excellent skill for anybody in today's information society.

Developing games can also be a fun way for a parent to teach their child programming and have fun together. Personally, I don't like playing computer games-I get bored quickly with them. But my son wants me to play with him. We've now started developing a computer game together and that has been lots of fun for both of us. Developing a game together also means I get some control over the content of the game.

So how do you get into game creation? And what if you aren't a programmer? I've looked at a number of game development environments that might be suitable for children. The one I liked most is called Game Maker. It is available for download at www.gamemaker.nl. Game Maker is free although a donation of \$15 is suggested. It is a visual development environment, where kids click and drag out events and actions that they add to objects. Very little typing is needed. However, when kids are ready, there is a fairly complete programming language available within the development environment that will teach them basic programming syntax useful for any command line language (a programming language that is typed out). Since kids have varying typing skills, not having to type in order to create games is a great feature.

There are a number of example games, tutorials, and resources available with Game Maker that help you get started. There are thousands of games that have been developed with it that you can download and play for free so that kids can see what is possible. So next time the kids are bugging you to buy or play a computer game, why not start creating your own game with them instead. Its a lot of fun and a lot of learning.

The Boulder Fire Department warns residents to be cautious this season, particularly with the fire hazards posed by candles and other holiday decorations.

"It is extremely important to extinguish candles and unplug holiday lights before going to bed or leaving your home," said Fire Marshal Ron Mahan."In Boulder, candles are one of the highest fire risks," said Sherry Kenyon, Boulder Fire Department's fire safety coordinator. "People leave the room or fall asleep while a candle is burning and decorations or table linens catch fire. These fires are very easy to prevent - simply blow out candles before you leave a room or fall asleep. In December, the number of candle fires doubles nationally, resulting in an average \$126 million property loss."
